July

Wednesday- Friday, July 7-9, Hiking, Paddling in Harriman State Park

Stay overnight in rustic Camp Thendara, home of the Thendara Mountain Club. Camp Thendara is located off Seven Lakes Drive between Tiorati and Kanuwauke Circles. Hiking is available from the camp, Reeves Meadow or Silvermine trail heads. After hiking, return to the camp and use the Thendara Mountain Club's kayaks and canoes or swim in Lake Tiorati. (It is not possible to launch your own boat from the camp, and the park requires a permit to use one of their launch sites.) Overnight charge is \$12/night plus the shared costs of simple, but nutritious breakfasts and dinners. Share in meal preparation and cleanup. Bring your own lunches, towel, bed linens. Wednesday, July 7, Ashuwillticook Rail Trail Bicycle

This lovely rail trail along the Cheshire reservoir and the Hoosic River is a 20 mile round trip. We start at the Berkshire Mall and travel north to Adams, where we can have lunch, then return to the starting point. Bring water and snacks. Helmets are required. Saturday, July 10, Overlook Mountain (Catskills) B-2-B

Overlook Mountain offers excellent views from the fire tower located at the summit and from exposed cliff views to the east. The total distance for the loop is 5 miles with an ascent of 1,400 feet (summit elevation is 3140 feet). Most of the hike will be along a gravel road that ends at the Overlook Hotel ruins. The hike time will be approximately 4 hours with a lunch break at the top. Co-leaders: Frank

Wednesday, July 14, Jay Mountain (Adirondacks) B-3-B

A lesser climbed peak with really great views. Jay Mountain is at the end of an open ridge at 3600 feet. It is 3 miles from the road or a 6 mile RT with an ascent of 1900 feet. Saturday, July 17, Buck Mountain (Southern Adirondacks) C-3-B

Please join us as we enjoy this moderately strenuous hike near Lake George. The view from the top affords a fine overlook of Lake George and the mountains to the north. We will start from the Hogtown parking area. The round trip hiking distance is 4.6 miles and the elevation gain is about 1200 feet. Saturday, July 17, Kaaterskill Falls & Escarpment (Catskills) B-3-B

This is Part 1 of a series of waterfalls hikes. Saturday, July 24, Crane Mountain (Adirondacks) B-3-A

This spectacular small Adirondack peak (3250 feet) features a nearly 360-degree view (including the High Peaks) from a shoulder west of the charming pond that will mark the midpoint of the hike. On this day, we should

Saturday, July 24, North Lake Area (Catskills) A-2-B

This hike has many excellent views from the top of cliff faces. These views were an inspiration for the Hudson River School painters. The total hiking distance is approximately 8 miles. The elevation rises and falls along the trail from a low point of 1900 feet by the Layman Monument to a high point of 2600 feet by the junction of the Rock Shelter Trail and the Escarpment Trail. On May 6, six members of the chapter spent the day using bow saws, clippers, loppers, rakes and hoes to open up a new trail in the Park's northwest section, on a ridge overlooking the Hudson River. We worked alongside about 25 members of the Lower Hudson Valley unit of the Student Conservation Association. Altogether, we completed about two miles of a new trail. The supervisor of the three day project, Ben Snyder, was most grateful for our help and pleased by the amount of work done in one day. Members who helped were Wally Herrod, David Newell, Kathleen Helfrich, Sharon Bonk, John Tiff, and Mary Folsom.

On April 24, six chapter members, Jeff Carden, Gerry Weber, Myra Fedyniak, Kathleen Helfrich, Sharon Bonk, and Anneliese Lawson, participated in the Rensselaer Land Trust's Tomhannock Reservoir Clean Up Day. Executive Director Christine Young, thanking us, reported that over 50 people turned out and cleared a total of 17 miles of shoreline, removing 100 bags of garbage. The Tomhannock provides 70% of Rensselaer County's drinking water.
