New Years Day Snowshoe & Potluck

January 1, 2010

Schodack State Park, Rt 9J
South of Castleton NY

Join in what has become a chapter tradition, a New Year's Day snowshoe followed by a potluck luncheon at a member's home. Last year's locale, weather, and potluck were great so we are planning the same locales and hope the weather will cooperate with enough snow for us. We will meet at 10 AM at Schodack State Park, off Rte 9J in southern Rensselaer County for a snowshoe or x-c ski (or hike if there is insufficient snow). There is a choice of a long or short loop of about 3 or 5 miles, mostly on level terrain with views along the Hudson River.

Afterwards, we caravan to Frank and Dee Wind's house in nearby Castleton for a potluck luncheon and chapter meeting beginning around 1 pm. If you skip the outing part, go to the Winds around 1 PM.

Sunday, February 7, Afternoon Snowshoe/ski, Grafton Lake State Park, C-3-C

Snowshoe or ski (if sufficient snow cover) around Long and Shaver ponds. Distance: about 3-4 flat miles. Taconic Crest Challenge

The End to End, a 29 mile endurance challenge along the Taconic Crest Trail will be held on May 15, 2010. Sponsored by the Taconic Hiking Club, the one day event welcomes all hikers. On an unimproved woods trail, the hike is only for the fit and experienced entrant. The club rewards the successful hikers with a unique trail certificate and patch for traversing a cumulative elevation gain of 7836 feet and a descent of 9470 feet. Those who completed the event in 2008 are not eligible for 2010. The Taconic Hiking Club will set up a campsite on Friday May 14, 2010 at the Berry Pond start line in the Pittsfield State Forest near Pittsfield MA. At that time, entrants will be briefed about trail conditions. The hike itself will start at 5:30 AM on May 15, with three support sites en route and sweep parties following the hikers. Registration forms including a \$30 fee (refunded through March 31) are accepted beginning January 1, 2010. There is a ceiling enrollment of 25, and alternate list will be kept for substitutes in the case of cancellations.

A Word From our **Chapter Chair**



Our Mohawk Hudson Chapter is the smallest among the 12 chapters in the Appalachian Mountain Club, but we are going strong, and welcome your stepping forward and helping us to expand our range of outdoor and committee activities. As I take on being your chapter chair, I would like to encourage more of our members of all ages to share your talents

and skills, so that our chapter becomes known for “hiking and other activities for people of all ages and abilities.”

One of the strengths of our chapter has been offering distance- and difficulty-friendly hiking trips for folks who love to be with others love exploring in the outdoors, but don't see hiking as an athletic event. Our mid-week and HARP (hiking at a relaxed pace) are very popular, with a nucleus of regulars, and frequent new or occasional joiners. We welcome your ideas for new activities, such as biking or kayaking, and hope you will consider offering to lead for us friendly trips that might not be too physically challenging, as these seem to be most popular, and what we do well.

If you are a younger AMC member and/or find that the number of more strenuous hikes we offer is too few, we welcome your input and participation in our leadership training so that the chapter can offer more of this type of activity also. We would welcome someone engaged in the on-line social networking scene to organize and lead

AMC/MH activities. For people who like trail-building activities, we have trails north and south of the Capital District in need of people to be active trail maintainers. If you are an armchair enthusiast, consider joining our Conservation Committee to work on land use, environmental and related activities. And, as always, ask your friends to join and be part of the fun!

Winter Hiking Footwear

Now that snow and ice will be with us perhaps into April, make sure that you have in your pack appropriate winter foot gear. It may be 40F in Albany, but on a Catskill, Taconic, or Adirondack region trail you are likely to find ice even if conditions do not require snowshoes. Many of our members recommend Stabilicers, thick soles with ‘tire studs’, (32north.com) for icy conditions. Stabilicers now come in 4 versions, lite, sport, original, and overshoe. My personal experience with the lite product is that they are not for our trails. Micro-spikes (kahtoola.com) are a new product. These are not to be confused with or substituted for crampons which are necessary for winter peaks and ice climbing. Yak-traks and lesser products will not work well on trails with rocks and ice. *The Gansett Gazette* (AMC Narragansett Chapter) recommends fishermen’s cleats from a sporting goods store “if you are not yet committed to winter hiking and want something less expensive”.
